Super Summer Breaks Records

Super Summer 2022 made history as a record number of nearly 350 high school students and adult counselors descended upon the campus of Cedarville University for a week of Bible study, worship, and spiritual challenge. Super Summer began in 2003 as a

ministry to students in grades seven through twelve with an emphasis upon spiritual leadership development.

The Lord moved in a powerful way throughout the week. I am thrilled to report that nineteen students prayed to receive Christ and thirty-one students made decisions to go public with their faith in believers' baptism. Thirty students made decisions to enter full-time ministry and sixty-seven indicated a desire to serve in missions.

Super Summer is an immersive experience for students. Not only do they gather each night for worship, but they also learn throughout the day in small groups and attend breakout sessions of their choosing. Impactful sessions included “The Power of Prayer” led by Dave Earley of FBC Grove City, “Reconciling Relationships” by Patrick Stalnaker from FBC Kettering, and many others. Dean Fulks, lead pastor of Lifepoint Church in Lewis

completed. For example, seventh grade students attended the red school and studied the basic doctrines of the Christian faith. Other schools emphasized small group topics such as finding identity in Christ, making faith your own, leading by serving, cultivating a Biblical worldview, and clarifying God's call on your life. In addition, one school specifically helped students prepare for a calling into ministry.

Super Summer was a life-changing week for many. We are grateful to the Lord for his grace and mercy at Super Summer and I am thankful for your faithful generosity to the Cooperative Program, which makes events like this possible.

The five “prophets and teachers” at the church were gifted for ministry and appear to function similarly to pastors or elders at the Antioch church. Our churches must be ready to send out those in whom we have invested and who have blessed us with their ministry. Second, the Antioch church had conducted the Great Commission in its context. Notice the diversity of the five leaders mentioned. If the church’s leadership was comprised of such cultural, ethnic, and social diversity, one can only imagine the constitution of the church’s membership! The church at Antioch was the first to formally launch a missionary work to the Gentiles. The Great Commission was part of their DNA.

Third, the passion of the Antioch church flowed from their devotion to the Lord. This important missionary moment was birthed during a time of “worshiping and fasting.” John Piper says that “Worship is the goal and the fuel of missions... Because we have tasted the joy of worshiping Jesus, and we want all the families of the earth included.” This was the heart of the Antioch Church.

The Antioch church demonstrates that a faithful church can and should be a sending church. Our prayer that God would send laborers into the harvest where we are must be coupled with willingness to send laborers from our churches to wherever God might send for sake of the nations. We do this knowing that God will be faithful to

supply all our needs to accomplish the work He has called us to do.

Chaplains Share Hope of the Gospel, Set Training for September

Ohio Disaster Relief (DR) teams deploy regularly to offer help, hope, and healing to victims of disasters. They offer help to meet pressing physical needs - removing fallen trees, cleaning up flood waters, and providing hot meals.

However, caring for physical needs is only part of the mission. DR also offers hope and healing through the work of the DR Chaplain Unit.

DR chaplains train extensively for their important work. Chaplain Training includes how to share the gospel, and how to be a chaplain. In addition, chaplains train in Operation Stress First Aid (OSFA) which teaches them how to help disaster victims and DR team members manage the trauma and pressure of a disaster situation.

“The heart of Disaster Relief is the gospel. All team members train to share the gospel,” said John Heading, DR director. “Trained DR chaplains

The area experienced ninety-mile-an-hour straight line winds which caused considerable damage. As teams were working to clean up the area, chaplains were busy reaching out to homeowners and anyone else who would listen to the gospel.

“Through the team’s efforts, seven people came to know the Lord during the two-week deployment,” said Heading. “One person was the clerk at the hotel where the Incident Management Team was staying and Chaplain Larry Randolph introduced a Jewish woman to Jesus Christ, and she became a believer.”

Anyone who wants to serve as a DR chaplain needs to attend training. The next DR Chaplain Training is set for September 16-17, at Jersey Church in New Albany, just outside Columbus. The cost is \$40 and includes training manual, meals, and snacks. Those attending may sleep at Jersey Church, but showers are not available.

As part of Chaplain Training, Ohio DR is pleased to welcome Brent Bond, senior director of chaplaincy and public service endorser at the North American Mission Board (NAMB) as guest speaker.

“If you are a chaplain and haven’t deployed in a while, this would be a

good time to update your training,” said Linda Humston, DR chaplain coordinator. “If you are currently serving as a chaplain and want to attend any or all the training, you are welcome.”

Team From Central Ohio Ministers to Las Vegas Church Plant

When Pastor Darryl Hammock, City of Refuge, Whitehall, called Pastor Dave Tatlock of The Oasis Church, Las Vegas, and asked if he could bring a mission team to assist the young church plant, Tatlock was utterly humbled and shocked that anyone would want to come to his little church in the hottest heat of the year to work with them.

The Oasis Church began recruiting a core group of ten to twelve believers in July 2021. Since then, the church has started meeting and worshipping together.

Back in Columbus, Angie Adkins and her daughter Kristyana decided to be part of the City of Refuge mission trip

team to Las Vegas. However, Adkins was concerned about two things as they prepared for their first mission trip – the finances and the reactions of others.

An answer to part of the financial burden came when Adkins and her daughter applied for and received the Ohio WMU Joan White Scholarship. The scholarship is for women/girls who are going on a mission trip for the first time or on their first international mission trip. Applicants may request up to twenty-five percent of their required funds.

With finances supplied, Adkins faced the reactions of others head-on. “When I would tell people I was going on a mission trip to Las Vegas, the reaction was a bit of disbelief,” said Adkins. “This reaction made me slightly anxious of the unknown, but I felt like there was a reason that God had opened this door for my daughter and me to have this experience together.”

The group’s first day in Las Vegas meant being outside in 111-degree weather, passing out block party fliers and inviting people to the party at a local park on the northeast side of Las Vegas the next day.

After the block party, the team held VBS in an apartment complex’s pool house close to the block party location. They had twenty children in attendance the first day and thirty-five children the second day. “The kids were excited for us to be there, and they were very attentive,” said Adkins. “It was such a success that I feel like God revitalized the spirit of the people of The Oasis Church. There is need everywhere and I learned that people want to know God and His love. I am truly grateful for being blessed by this experience.”

The City of Refuge mission team also blessed The Oasis Church by introducing the church’s name to the community through VBS, block party and door to door invites. The mission team also encouraged and

Frankfort Woman Finds “Beauty for Ashes”

Sharon Hammond has a story to tell – a tale of “Beauty for Ashes.”

Hammond’s story began at Frankfort Baptist Church according to Cathy Pound, Executive Director of Ohio Women’s Missionary Union (WMU). “Mary Wink, the pastor’s wife, and the women from the church shared the gospel with Sharon and prayed for her for a long time,” said Pound. The Frankfort women’s group invited Sharon to attend the SCBO 2022 Women’s Spring Retreat at First Baptist Lancaster where God did a work of transformation in Sharon’s life.

“Hi, my name is Sharon Hammond. I gave my life to Christ on May 14, 2022, while attending the ladies’ retreat “Beauty for Ashes” in Lancaster, Ohio,” said Hammond. “Praise the Lord. I got SAVED!”

Hammond had lived a difficult life prior to accepting Christ. “My life was horrible. My husband had passed.

I had lost a son and a daughter. I was miserable and lonely before I accepted Jesus into my heart.”

On June 26, Hammond followed the Lord in baptism. Her pastor, Paul Wicks, who also was instrumental in her conversion, baptized her at Frankfort BC. “I thank my pastor for

preaching the truth which helped me understand that I needed a change in my life and that change was loving Jesus and accepting him into my heart,” said Hammond.

Mary Wink sees the change in Hammond’s life. “Sharon is coming faithfully with her daughter Debbie to Bible study and worship service,” said Mary Wink.

“God showed up and He showed out with His redemptive power in action,” said Pound. “Sharon experienced God’s love and she was transformed from ashes to beauty when she surrendered her life into Christ.”

FIRST, you must believe that God loves you and wants you to have peace in your heart and an everlasting life (John 3:16).

SECOND, you must recognize that you are a sinner, that you have done things which have displeased God and that you have separated yourself from Him (Romans 3:23; 6:23).

THIRD, you must believe that Jesus came to this earth, was actually God in the flesh, lived a perfect life, and yet went to a cruel cross, dying for your sins, paying once and for all the penalty of sin (I Peter 2:24). However, it's not enough just to

know these three things. Many of us knew them for years before we ever gave Jesus our lives.

FOURTH, you must personally ask Jesus to come into your life and forgive you of your sins (Revelation 3:20).

You can pray this prayer now and if you mean it with all of your heart, Jesus will come in just like He said. He cannot lie.

Dear Lord Jesus, I know that I am a sinner. I'm really sorry for my sins, Lord. I ask you now, Lord Jesus, to come into my heart, forgive me of my sins, take control of my life, and make me the kind of person You want me to be. I now receive You into my heart. Thank You for coming in. I will follow You all the days of my life. In Your name I pray, Amen.
