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# **Fueling the Mission of Missionaries**

Annie Armstrong... I am not sure what comes to your heart and mind when you hear her name, but I think about moving from Memphis, Tennessee to Marysville, Ohio in 2008 to plant a church called Living Hope. Although Annie Armstrong is now in Heaven, her legacy and ministry impact live on. I was direct recipient and benefited greatly from this financial offering as we planted, grew, and multiplied the new church.

The North American Mission Board (NAMB) has named its annual offering after her and one hundred percent of the offering helps missionaries spread the gospel across North America. To that end, approximately fifty percent of the overall NAMB budget is raised through the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering

According to NAMB, the offering was started in 1895 by Woman's Missionary Union (WMU) to benefit the work of the Home Mission Board (now North American Mission Board). In 1934, it was named in honor of Annie Armstrong, a bold missions advocate and WMU's first national executive leader. Today, more than \$2 billion has been donated by Southern Baptist churches and individuals to support thousands of

missionaries in church planting and compassion ministries. Because of this sacrificial giving, millions of lives have been and continue to be transformed by the power of the gospel. Currently, we have sixty-eight Send Ohio church planters that are actively planting new churches here in the Buckeye State. They are in big cities, small towns and

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everywhere in Ohio telling everyone that God loves them and wants a relationship with them. Therefore, we give, and therefore we sacrifice. Your support helps fund over 2,400 missionaries here in North America, where there are nearly 371M people representing 350 languages and nearly 281M are estimated to be lost without Christ.

If we are going to reach Ohio and North America with the gospel of Christ, the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering is an incredible opportunity to fuel the mission of our missionaries.


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The impulse in our hearts is to be missionaries, and the Midwest is greatly lacking in ministry to Hispanics.

# Disaster Relief Serves East Palestine Residents Following Train Derailment

The derailment of a Norfolk Southern train in the rural town of East Palestine, Ohio has been in the public eye for weeks. Recently, Dr. John Heading, state director of Ohio Southern Baptist Disaster Relief (OSBDR) traveled to the crash site and met with Norfolk Southern executives to investigate how OSBDR could help residents impacted by the disaster.

According to Heading, one of the biggest concerns right now is the safety of the drinking water. "Norfolk Southern is providing free bottled water, air quality testing, and water well testing in the affected areas," said Terry Richey, Norfolk Southern, director, legal claims.

Speaking with residents of the area, Heading recognized that East Palestine residents are hoping for more. "I was

floored at how uncertain and anxious the residents were," said Heading. "They want to believe what they are being told, but they are hearing so many conflicting things that they do not know who to believe."

Heading discovered that the greatest unmet need is to help residents clean the inside of their houses, enabling them to go home and feel confident that it is as safe as it can be. The first OSBDR team deployed to East Palestine recently, working to bring Help, Hope, and Healing to those impacted. The team included nine members who traveled from Middletown, Fairborn, Pickerington, Heath, Elyria, and Cuyahoga Falls to East Palestine on the Ohio-Pennsylvania border.

"There is still a lot of assigning blame, but in talking with the Norfolk Southern executives, I indicated that we were there to help the residents and that we would leave it to others to resolve those issues," said Heading. "There were several homes cleaned on the first day. With two of the homes, the railroad tracks went right through their backyards. You could stand on the tracks and look just a short distance to the left and see the crash site," said Heading.

Speaking of the miracle of regeneration, Jesus told Nicodemus, "The wind blows where it wishes, and you hear its sound, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit" (John 3:8). I've heard this verse several times in recent days to describe how God moves and stirs His people. I have found it to be helpful in thinking about ministry in the local church. We cannot always know what God is doing in the church through long, seemingly unremarkable days of ministry. Yet big doors may turn on small hinges.

Last year, I went through some of the most intense, taxing months of my ministry. I was pulled in various directions and felt like my productivity and effectiveness as a pastor was at its lowest point. Yet, in this season, we saw more baptisms at Briggs Road Baptist than we had seen in any single year since I became the pastor. Time would fail me to recount some of the amazing things we saw last year apart from my own effort (I'm going to ask you not to try to connect any dots there!). What I am saying is that there are times that we work and toil and see little fruit, yet there are seasons in which God does great things and we cannot even really find a direct reason other than the supernatural work of the Spirit of God.

#### Share about your background.

"I grew up attending church and my parents modeled lives devoted to Jesus. Despite this upbringing, near the end of high school I began living a double life where I was one person at church and another person around my non-Christian friends. Going to college at Bowling Green State University (BG) the temptation to live a double life remained. However, I knew I needed to find a church. I heard about this 'Water Church' meeting on campus. Seeing hundreds of college students worshipping God had a profound effect on me. Everyone at this service was there because they wanted to be. I met guys who started to pour into my life; I confessed sin; and I made the decision to stop living a double life and give Jesus my everything."

# How did you decide to become a church planter?

"At H2O BG, I began reading my Bible daily and got discipled. During this season God gave me the desire

to go into ministry. Around this time H2O Church started the H2O Network and began helping plant other H2O churches around Ohio. I felt a calling from God to be a part of this mission to reach college students through church planting. I went on staff after graduating college and got involved in our church's Pastors in Training Program. This program helped me to

grow to understand God's calling on my life to be a pastor and develop skills for church planting."

# Why did you choose Ohio University, Athens, as the location for your church plant?

"In 2018, my wife and I felt our time in Bowling Green was coming to an end, and God was calling us to plant an H2O Church. We felt a strong desire to go to a difficult place and after looking at all the options available, Ohio University, in Athens, Ohio, stood above the rest. OU is known as one of the top party schools in the country, and Athens, Ohio is also considered a "post-Christian" city. We knew of many people over the years who spent some time in the area and shared how hard it was to follow God there. Athens is in the

Appalachian region of Ohio, and the area is known for its high drug use and poverty rate. Despite all of this, we felt a strong calling from God to go."

# What challenges have you faced at H2O Athens, and how have you seen the Lord work through them?

"The first challenge we faced was planting near the end of Covid. Thankfully God led us through this and it seemed like college students coming out of covid were seeking

community and answers more than ever. Beyond this, planting in a new city has its difficulties. Athens can feel like the middle of nowhere and you can feel that while you here. But as we've gotten more acclimated to the area, this place has felt more and

more like home. The people are truly amazing, and we've been blessed by the support of other churches and ministries in the area who have not been territorial but truly have welcomed us in."

# What victories have you experienced at H2O Athens?

"We have been encouraged by the life change we have seen. We have baptized seven people already. All of them with unique stories. It is funny how before planting a church you have all these plans and dreams, but it is special when you start to see people come to services, grow as leaders, and become your friends. I feel like in these moments we just start to feel worshipful and thankful to God and how he begins to use the people you're ministering to start ministering back to you. Currently we have seventy people coming to our Sunday gatherings and we offer small groups during the week."

# What are your long-term goals for H2O Athens?

"Long term, we have a dream of seeing H2O Athens grow into a multigenerational church that seeks to reach both the campus and the city with the gospel. Our partnership with the SCBO and our local association has been significant in our desire to meet this goal. That partnership led us to meet our good friends, Pastor Jim Difilippo and his wife Jean, who served at First Baptist Church in Athens for a number of years. After we moved to Athens, the Difilippos along with the members of FBC

Athens shared a desire to partner with us in our mission to reach the campus and the city. In the summer of 2022, the members of FBC Athens

voted unanimously to merge with us, which resulted in H2O Athens receiving their building. We've been meeting primarily on campus for services but our plan once we're ready is to have two services, one on campus and the other at the former FBC Athens building. Please continue to pray for us in this process that we would continue to be faithful to the calling God has for us."

# **Church in Need Receives Aid From Cooperative Program, Other Churches**

On December 30, 2022, the building of New Journey Church in Cleveland sustained significant damage at the hands of a hit and run driver. The still unknown driver sped one thousand feet across the church's front yard and plowed into the facility, leaving a gaping hole.

Pastor Charles Redmon contacted Reginald Hayes, SCBO convention relations, to see what help SCBO might be able to provide. Hayes contacted John Heading, director of Disaster Relief, to see if DR might be able to lend aid.

## "I just felt it was something we should do"

However, "The scope of the work was beyond what we could do right now," said Heading.

The church found a contractor who was willing to repair the hole in the building for \$15,000, but New Journey didn't have those funds available. They collected

\$5,000 and the contractor agreed to fix the building and allow them to pay the other \$10,000 when they were able to raise the money.

At this point Disaster Relief stepped back into the picture as Heading began reaching out to SCBO churches and North American Mission Board Send Relief to raise the funds to pay off the \$10,000 debt. "I just felt it was something we should do. We couldn't repair the damage, but together we could pay the bill," said Heading. "I sent emails to ten SCBO churches for support. I also sent an email to Coy Webb, Southern Baptist Disaster Relief senior leader, who forwarded the email to Josh Benton, domestic vice president of Send Relief North American Ministry.

Heath, University Baptist Church, Beavercreek, First Baptist Church, Fairborn, and a private donor provided the rest of the money so New Journey

Church could pay the contractor and move forward from this incident.

"The financial gifts toward the needs at New Journey Church came from individuals, churches, Ohio Disaster Relief, and Send Relief Cooperative Program funds," Heading said. "Once the need was known, organizations across SBC and SCBO worked together to meet it. We can do so much more when we work together."

# First Baptist Church Mt. Orab Rehabs Old House for New Mission

The old house has been on the property of First Baptist Church (FBC), Mt. Orab, since the church built a new facility there in 2003. "It came with the property," said Kim Smith, secretary at FBC. Originally used as a place for the youth to meet, the house has been empty and unused in recent years.

About two years ago, church members began to consider what they should do

with the deteriorating building, and they hoped to find a worthwhile purpose for the outdated dwelling. They finally decided to turn the house at 706 South High Street, next door to the church, into a mission home to serve missionary families who need a place to live when they are in Ohio.

For the past six to seven months, twenty-five to thirty church members worked together to restore, decorate, and fully furnish the two-bedroom, one bath home, making it a comfortable place for missionaries and their families. "We put a lot of blood, sweat, and tears into the house," said Smith, who also served on the Design Team for the project. "It was exciting seeing it come together."

The Design Team collaborated with missionaries in mind as they remodeled the residence. "We set up the main bedroom as an oasis for the couple, and we were strategic with the second bedroom," Smith noted. They placed bunk bed in the room with a twin bed on top and a full bed below. "We tried to keep it classy for any aged kids," she added.

In addition to starting a new ministry, Smith says they also wanted to bring missions closer to home for FBC Mt. Orab. "We want our people to get enthused with missions."

The church already has a plan to welcome missionaries to the house and to their church. When a new missionary family comes to stay, the church members plan

to scrub the house clean and fully stock the kitchen for their guests. "We would really like to use it a lot," said Smith.

Led by Senior Pastor Jonathan Lawler, FBC recently celebrated the completion of the mission house with a ribboncutting, dedication, and open house at the new facility.

New SCBO Revitalization Consultant Mark Jones has experience in revitalizing declining churches, and he believes this new part-time job fits well with his current ministry focus. He has already revitalized churches in Ohio, and he is currently working to revitalize the church he pastors, Freedom Hill Community Church, Stow.

However, as a church planter, he was not always interested in revitalizing established churches. "I started as a church planter, and I did not care much for the established church," said Jones. He saw churches in declining health. "A lot of established churches had given up – they were going on hospice." Over time he grew to see the need for revitalization in established churches. "I grew to have a heart for the people."

As he begins his new position, Jones is working to determine the number of SCBO churches in decline, so he is looking through Annual Church Profile (ACP) data. So far, he believes that approximately sixty percent of SCBO churches are declining. He also feels this number is probably accurate across the nation.

Despite the data, Jones believes churches can be revitalized, and he can help them begin the process.

An examination of the church is the first step towards revitalization. "Every church should have an annual physical," said Jones, and he has resources to facilitate the process. "I can provide an assessment called 'The Pulse' that can let churches know where they are weak." Jones notes that doing an assessment can be hard work for the pastor and congregation but in the end it is worth it.

Once the assessment is complete, Jones has resources and training to help churches more forward to begin working on their weakest issues. "The hardest thing to admit is that your church needs a transition," said Jones. "I love for the church to discover the needs themselves. If they discover it, they own it."
