- Because of the re-election of Bart Barber as our SBC President for another year
- Because of the continued support for the Sexual Abuse Task Force

That is why I am encouraged. I fully believe that we are headed in the right direction. It is indeed a good day to be a Southern Baptist, but an even better day to be an Ohio Baptist. Currently, through the first six months of our fiscal year, our Cooperative Program





giving is ahead of last year. I want to say thank you to all our churches that give faithfully and sacrificially through the Cooperative Program, which helps fuel the mission across the street to our neighborhoods here in Ohio and around the world to the nations. Did you know that we have over 3,500 missionaries and 2,700 children on the mission field that are dependent on your generosity. They say "thank you" as well.

Another reason I am encouraged is that baptisms are up as well. Our churches in Ohio continue to remain focused on the mission, which is to proclaim the gospel of Jesus and make disciples. Our SCBO team stands ready to assist our local churches in any way that we can. Part of being in a family means loving one another through tough times. Even as I write these words on my flight home back to Ohio, it has been bumpy. However, toward the end, the rough air departed, and smooth air arrived. It is funny how I never seem to appreciate a smooth flight until I have experienced a little turbulence.

Let us be encouraged together. Let us cooperate together. Let us stick together.

Rachel grew up with a deep understanding of what the missionary life looked like. Her church had a strong missions program. In addition to her training at church, she developed a love for missions through her family. She learned about the missionary life as she played with her cousins, sat around a family holiday table, and heard her aunts and uncles share their adventures of watching God work across the globe.

Her grandparents, though not missionaries themselves, had instilled in her parents, aunts, and uncles a love for the nations. Of their four children, two became International Mission Board missionaries.

In high school, Rachel met Tyler English. He grew up on the mission field. While the IMB missionary kid life held many adventures and ways for him to plug into his parents' ministry, he always loved seeing how his parents approached ministry as a team.

"For years, I was able to witness the gospel being shared firsthand, all while playing a supportive role in my parents' work," he shared. "Through this experience, I became confident in my calling to serve Jesus on the mission field."

Now, Tyler and Rachel are headed to Guatemala, using their experience as parents and passion for orphan care to serve in the Americas and "empower the local church to raise up the next generation for Christ." They are excited to raise their three daughters, Asher (5), Graycen (3), and Wrenley (1), on the mission field, continuing the tradition and instilling a love for the nations in their children.

Tyler and Rachel are two of the seventy-nine missionaries recognized at the IMB's Sending Celebration in conjunction with the 2023 Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana. The Sending Celebration took place June 13 directly following the IMB report to the SBC.

D. Ray Davis, IMB's church mobilization manager, former missionary and Rachel English's uncle, knows the value of a missions legacy.

"We are part of a big Southern Baptist family, and we have a responsibility to live out the vision and mission of our bigger family," Davis said. "By sharing my love for the nations with Rachel, I was just playing my part in my family for the kingdom."

Both he and Rachel agree that having a family connection personalized the call to missions. Her Uncle D. Ray and Aunt Kim, who served in Sub-Saharan Africa, and her Uncle Daren and Aunt Shawna who currently serve in Sub-Saharan Africa, were just normal people who followed the call of God on their lives. She could do that too.

The Englishes were not the only new missionaries with a legacy of reaching the nations through the IMB. Of the seventy-nine newly appointed missionaries present for the Sending Celebration, seven have parents who have served with the IMB on the mission field and forty-two have served in some capacity with the IMB. One of the new missionaries is a fifth-generation missionary, continuing her family's long legacy of getting the gospel to the nations through the IMB.

Southern Baptists Continuing the Legacy

As the Sending Celebration began, transitioning from the report portion of the morning, SBC President Bart Barber noted, "What we're about to do is the business of the convention."

This was affirmed in applause and cheers from messengers. After the missionaries gave their short testimonies, the crowd stood to their feet, applauding those willing to take the gospel to the nations.

The IMB celebrates a rich history of reaching the nations. Over their 178-year history, the IMB has sent more than 25,000 missionaries to the nations. Currently, more than 3,500 are on the field, taking the gospel to the least reached.

IMB President Paul Chitwood celebrated the forty-four churches in nineteen different states that the new missionaries represent. The missionaries are a result of the long history of Southern Baptists to reach the nations. They will soon move to thirty-three countries, "taking the good news with them, willing to leave behind comforts, friends and family, to answer God's call upon their lives," Chitwood said.

"Day in and day out, they'll trust that God is good and will do good as they labor in the harvest fields where God has called them," he continued. "They will also trust that you and me, Southern Baptists, will hold the ropes for them as we pray and as you give and send more reinforcements to walk alongside them. They will work in cities, deserts, and mountains. They go to the hard-to-reach places to work among the displaced and dispersed, the forgotten and forsaken by the world, but not by their Creator."

"The stark reality today is that lostness is growing. It is increasing rapidly – here in our own country and especially in our cities, where we face division and hopelessness but also among the 8 billion people living on Earth today," Chitwood reminded messengers and guests at the annual meeting, as he urged them to consider the work that has yet to be finished.

Chitwood added, "Together, we will reach every nation, no matter the cost."

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Genoa Bible Institute for Adults Launching this Fall

At the end of most of Paul's letters, we find oft-neglected portions of Scripture in which Paul signs off with final greetings, instructions, and travel plans. Like the genealogies of the Old Testament, some may struggle to find relevance in these passages. However, these seemingly mundane paragraphs reveal something important in Paul's missionary strategy: partnership and cooperation.

Paul was not an army of one. His missionary work was made possible by partnership. Paul depended on his gospel networks, beginning with the church at Antioch in Syria, which sent him to his traveling companions and his financial partners in the local churches.

Leaving the 2023 Annual Meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in New Orleans, I was encouraged and reminded of why we cooperate. It is not merely a pragmatic decision but a partnership that conforms to the biblical model of missionary cooperation. As always, the International Mission Board Sending Celebration was the highlight of our time, with seventy-nine missionaries sent to the nations because of our cooperation.

I am thankful that God has given us such a stewardship with our convention. I am encouraged because of the missionary zeal present in our convention and the desire for theological faithfulness. We saw both expressed this year at our annual meeting. I am hopeful for the future of our convention as we champion the mission while holding fast to our common faith.

Ohio Church Planter Travels to Germany in New IMB-Send Network Partnership By Stephanie Heading, managing editor



Send Network Ohio Church Planter Nick Abraham recently traveled to Germany as part of a new Send Network partnership with the International Mission Board (IMB) -- Church Planter Global Vision Trips.

Abraham pastors Reformation Bible Church, a oneyear-old church plant in Navarre, near Canton, and when he heard about this initiative for church planters, it piqued his interest.

"I had never been on any kind of cross-cultural mission trip," said Abraham. "I never wanted to go somewhere on a 'Christian vacation.' I wanted it to be purposeful and meaningful."

Send Network is partnering with the International Mission Board to mobilize church planters to experience the nations. The 2023 trips are scheduled for five international locations: Lahore, Pakistan; Frankfurt, Germany; Delhi, India; Sofia, Bulgaria; and Mumbai, India.

Abraham found Frankfurt, Germany intriguing because of the secularization of its society. "I wanted to go see and learn how church planters there are reaching people in a secular society."

Abraham applied for the Germany trip and was excited when he was selected as one of six church planters from the United States traveling to Frankfort, Germany, spending a week meeting with IMB pastors and church planters.

"At Send Network, one of our values is Seek First the Kingdom, and that means taking the gospel beyond North America," said Mike Laughrun, Send Network director of global engagement.

"We had a very full week," said Abraham. The group met with pastors and church planters in Frankfurt, as well as working with the substantial number of refugees in Germany. They also walked around Frankfurt, conducting a survey to meet people. While he enjoyed meeting the locals, Abraham did admit that sometimes he experienced a language barrier.

"In Germany, only forty-five percent of the German population are German," Abraham noted. "The rest of the country are from the nations. It shocked me. It was fascinating that the nations are all in Germany."

In addition to the nations living in Germany, Abraham also learned that church culture in Germany is quite different from the United States. "The typical church there has thirty to forty people, and a mega-church has about two hundred people," he said. "Only one or two people a year come to church and get saved, but that is joyfully celebrated."

The work is slow in Frankfurt because less than one percent of the population are evangelical. "The majority in Frankfurt don't know Jesus and don't know anyone who knows Jesus."

However, despite the dire statistics, church planters in Frankfurt have developed a strategy to reach the lost. "They do not have events, like block parties, because if they did, no one would come. They are doing the slow work of cultivating relationships with those around them," said Abraham.

Seeing the gospel shared in the secularized German culture helped Abraham coalesce his thoughts about reaching his community in Navarre. "Our culture is not there yet, but we can see it heading there. We are rapidly secularizing here. The gospel is the need people have, so we need to be creative in connecting the dots for them."

Abraham believes his week in Frankfurt is affecting his work at Reformation Bible Church, Navarre, even as he is "still mentally unpacking" the experience. "We have planted, but we need to be engaging our community with the gospel. We need to think about things in a different way. 'Let's have an event' does not get what we want," he said. "It is not so much about us having an event. We need to live our message and engage with people God has put in front of us. It is longer and slower but seeing it in Frankfurt was helpful."

While Abraham hopes to be busy sharing the gospel in Navarre, he and his church are also planning to lend a hand in Frankfurt. "Our desire is to partner with them—



not just send them money. We want real partnerships that go both ways. We want to have a heart for the nations, and we want to start thinking about missions now."



Unlikely Partnership Blesses Ohio Church and South Dakota Ministry

Violet Baptist Church in Pickerington is a world away from the Pine Ridge Reservation and Chanku Waste (pronounced "wash-tay") Ranch in Porcupine, South Dakota. The ranch, located in one of the most impoverished areas of the United States, ministers to the Native American Oglala Lakota people.

For the past twelve years, despite their differences and challenges, Violet BC and Chanku Waste Ranch have been mission partners, working together to share the gospel and help interrupt the cycle of poverty.


"Ministry there is not for the faint of heart," said Brian Naess, small groups and missions pastor at Violet.

According to Naess, the partnership began in 2012 when a team from Violet traveled to South Dakota to conduct a summer camp at Chanku Waste Ranch and do additional ministry in Rapid City. For ten of the last twelve years, Violet teams have conducted summer camp at the ranch in June.

"Our desire was to connect with a mission and not just swoop in and swoop out," said Naess. More than twenty teams from Violet have ministered in South Dakota.

"Chanku Waste Ranch would not be anywhere close to where it is today without Violet Baptist Church," said Matt Hadden, North American Mission Board (NAMB) missionary at Chanku Waste Ranch. "In the early years of our partnership Violet would send a team out three times a year -- a construction team in the spring; a summer camp team in June; and a firewood ministry team in the fall."





In addition to mission trips, Violet also commissioned a couple from their church to minister permanently at Chanku Waste Ranch. Six years ago, Sarah Deible, a member of Violet, felt called to serve the Lord in a third-world country. Her husband Chad did not feel the same call, according to Naess. "Chad didn't want to leave North America," he recalled. However, after serving on a mission team to Chanku Waste Ranch, Chad returned home, believing the Lord was calling them to South Dakota.

The Deibles moved to Chanku Waste Ranch to serve with Hadden and his wife, Amanda. At the time, Had-

den was serving as director of the ranch, as well as Pastor of Creator's Fellowship, a church plant on the ranch. Chad took over the role of pastor, giving Matt more time to direct ministries at the ranch which has become a Send Relief Ministry Center. "To God be the glory that Chanku Waste Ranch is a Send Relief Center because of the cooperation of thousands of churches coming together to minister there," said Naess.

Hadden is thankful for the impact Violet Baptist Church has had in the ministry of the ranch. "Our relationship is so intertwined. I cannot imagine Chanku Waste Ranch without Violet Baptist," said Hadden. "They faithfully serve us, putting on some of the best weeks of summer camp at the ranch. There is not a building or structure on our property that has not been touched by the Violet

men's group in a huge way. Recently, they were here, helping us with summer camp and providing a dental professional for our clinic, serving the people in our community."

Hadden says that Chanku Waste Ranch is always looking for healthy partnerships. "We could not do what we do without the support of churches that are willing to send people to work alongside us."

Violet has also seen growth because of its ministry in South Dakota, according to Naess. "Our trips to Chanku Waste Ranch have enabled us to show people what missions are all about," he noted. "It is so exciting to see men step up on mission and see them grow. You leave your heart out there when you leave."

Naess also encourages other churches to step out and get involved in short-term mission projects. "I went on a short-term mission trip when I was younger, and now I am in the ministry. I would love to talk to anyone who is looking at a short-term mission trip."

Maize Road Celebrates Sixty Years of Ministry in a Diverse Community

Maize Road Baptist Church celebrated its sixtieth anniversary in early June. This northeast Columbus church is thankful for its past but sees its future developing through reaching the nations in its own backyard.

Over the past sixty years, the church has seen its demographic change. "We are an urban church at this point. We are multicultural," said Pastor Shawn Hensley. "Today we have four churches with three languages representing fifteen nations that meet in our building each Sunday."

The four church congregations worshiping at Maize Road include the current Maize Road congregation, an El Salvadorian congregation, a Congolese gathering, as well as a multicultural church. "We are certainly now a community-focused church," Hensley remarked.

The hardships of the Covid pandemic hit Maize Road hard. "We had 150 to 160 people before Covid," said Hensley. "Post Covid, only 35 came back." Hensley and the church had a decision to make--move away, change the outreach strategy, or let the church close.

Hensley grew up at Maize Road and served as youth pastor from 2004 until October 2019 when he was called as pastor. "I have a heart for reaching the urban areas of Ohio," he said. "I thrive in the urban community."





Maize Road is reshaping itself as it reaches out to its changing community. "We are a completely different church. Our outward approach has changed everything."

The outward approach includes a Food Bank that distributed 25,000 pounds of food to eight different nationalities in 2022, and a Free Store that gives away clothes and household items. The church also has a Community Ambassador who studies the cultures of new people groups coming to the church so culturally appropriate food items are available in the Food Bank.

The church recently completed a \$325,000 renovation on the facility. "For us, every single day we find a way to maximize our space," Hensley said. In addition to the four congregations meeting in the building, Maize Road also sponsors a Nepali after-school program and a summer program in the building.

Acquiring an additional building as well as paying off the debt for the renovation is the goal for the next three years. They are also hoping to start satellite language churches to benefit non-English speakers who currently attend Maize Road. "They record the service on a phone and then go home and use Google Translate to understand the message." In celebration of the sixtieth anniversary of Maize Road, four-hundred people from all four churches worshiped together in one service with translation into two different languages. Dr. Jeremy Westbrook, executive director-treasurer of the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio, preached the celebration message which was also translated into two languages.

"I've never done anything like that," said Hensley. "Translating in multiple languages at the same time looked good on paper, but I wasn't sure how it would turn out." The translation worked well, and the Spirit moved during the service and the international meal served on the grounds. "Everyone commented on how they felt the Spirit moving. Outside everyone was of one Spirit. It was energizing."

As Maize Road moves forward to reach its community. Hensley sees the church as vibrant and active at sixty years old. His church also looks different than it did in 1962. "That is why we changed the way we do things. You start to look like the community you are serving. Look around. We are all getting a glimpse of heaven."

Beginning the Revitalization Journey in Your Church

The process of revitalization can seem daunting, so for this month and next month, I want to share the approach that I take in church health and revitalization. using the acronym E.A.R.F.A.R.M.R to describe the process and partnerships along the way.

I start by lending an E.A.R. to the pastor or leader wishing to have a conversation about church health. It usually takes an hour to hear the story, and then I offer Encouragement. This encouragement includes sharing opportunities to thoroughly Assess the issues and hurdles within the church. Pastoral and congregational assessments can help discover what is hindering overall church health. Once the assessments are complete, I meet with the pastor or leadership to discuss Revitalization options. Often, revitalization begins by simply refocusing on Jesus, prayer, and the gospel. However, sometimes it takes a greater Biblical strategic process. To date, I have spoken with over thirty-five pastors throughout Ohio. I have also assessed churches and they have started moving toward revitalization.

Disaster Ready Churches Needed Across Ohio

When disaster strikes, finding a place to set up a command center and housing for Disaster Relief teams is one of the first priorities for Ohio Southern Baptist Disaster Relief (OSBDR).

In 2022, three tornadoes hit the Goshen, Ohio area, doing extensive damage. It was necessary to deploy teams to assist residents, but without a location for a command center and housing, help could not be rendered.

In Goshen, Pastor Phil Hopper of Hill Station Baptist Church opened the church to OSBDR. The church housed teams from Ohio, Michigan, and Tennessee for two weeks. Units working from Hill Station BC included recovery teams, incident command, chaplains, assessors, shower unit, and food unit.

Without Pastor Hopper welcoming OSBDR into the church, the community might not have received help, and more importantly, the people of Goshen might not have heard the gospel.

Disaster response begins and ends with the local church. It begins with the local church volunteers who train to serve and ends with the names of families helped given to the local church for follow-up. OSB-DR never starts a new ministry, but as team members work, they promote the local church.

OSBDR is looking for local churches to become Disaster Ready Churches. These churches are intentional and prepared when a disaster strikes. OSBDR

can quickly deploy to these churches, providing aid to the community and serving the local church families. Our goal is to have churches all over Ohio that are Disaster Ready Churches. OSBDR will come to the church and provide training, so the church is prepared when a disaster occurs.
