Now is the Time to be Vocal: Vote No on Issue 1



It's not political. It's biblical. On Tuesday, November 7, Ohioans will have the opportunity to vote NO on a constitutional amendment that would permanently legalize abortion up to birth. It would also legalize and include partial-birth abortion, removal of parental awareness consent for minors to receive abortions, and outlaw standards for hospital health and safety.

This issue is not about political party or economic status, it is simply about the right to life.

Ohio African American Fellowship Celebrates 15th Annual Gathering

In mid-September, the Ohio African American Fellowship (OAAF) of the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio (SCBO) celebrated its 15th annual gathering in Cleveland with three spirit-filled days of enlightenment. Seventy-five pastors and wives registered for this year's event at Mount Pleasant Baptist Church, Cleveland.

Guests included Florida Baptist Convention Catalysts, Dr. Jeffery Singletary, Erik Cummings, and Patrick Coats; and Zelvis Applin, pastor/planter, South Hills Church, Wimauma, Florida; Charles Grant, vice president for African American relations from the SBC Executive Committee; and David Mahan, policy director, Center for Christian Virtue.

Attendees from across Ohio worshiped, heard inspiring and challenging messages, and conducted OAAF business. In addition, Dr. Jeremy Westbook, SCBO executive director-treasurer, presented SCBO Pastor's Scholarships to four African American pastors: Pastor Karlie Hale, One Love

Community Church, Cleveland; Bruce McLaurin, First Baptist Church, South Euclid; Michael Carter, The Well Church of Toledo; and Bobbie Garrett, Jr., Cornerstone Missionary Baptist Church, Sandusky.

The OAAF elected Rodney Jackson, The Movement Church, Toledo, as the seventh president of the Fellowship. The OAAF pastor's wives assembled and encouraged each other. They discussed how to create healthy environments, protect their pastor/husbands, and strengthen women to stand against cultural pressures.

"God is at work in Ohio! It was a great honor to participate in this year's Ohio African American Fellowship of the State Convention of Baptists in Ohio (OAAF) gathering," said Patrick Coats, Florida Baptist Convention black multicultural catalyst. "There was a sweet fellowship and unity among pastors and wives. In settings like this I am always excited to hear the amazing Kingdom stories. I'm truly grateful for the opportunity to serve and be among these faithful brethren."

Swahili Church Plant Purchases Van Using Funds From Ray Roberts Offering By Stephanie Heading, managing editor

For 40 years, Pastor Kaleba Faliala has served the Lord as a pastor. He first served in his native Congo. When he became a refugee from his homeland, Faliala's location changed, but his mission and calling remained the same.

After spending time living in a refugee camp, the door opened for him and his family to immigrate to the United States in 2020. "The government of the United States selected me to come to America," said Faliala. In 2021, they settled in Akron, Ohio, where he began serving the Lord as a church planter.

Faliala planted Swahili Community Church Akron for Swahili speaking immigrants. The 18-month-old church plant currently ministers to approximately 130 immigrants who came to America from Congo where Swahili is the native language.

This year Swahili Community Church Akron was a recipient of funds from the 2022 Ray Roberts State Missions Offering. SCBO churches collect this offering each September and it benefits Ohio church planters and Ohio Southern Baptist Disaster Relief.

The Ray Roberts funds helped meet a significant need for the Swahili Community Church Akron – transportation. With Ray Roberts funds, the church was able to purchase a 12-passenger van. "One of the greatest problems is that very few of the people have driver's licenses," said Ohio Send Network Church Planter Buzz Kocher. "Those who do have licenses don't have a car. I am grateful to see the church get a van."

Kocher has collaborated with Pastor Faliala for the past year, visiting in the homes of church members.

"It's wild," said Kocher. "It feels like you are in Africa. It's a cross cultural experience only two hours from Columbus.

"Many of the people are refugees who spent many years in refugee camps. There are stories of the hard-ships they endured, but they have come here to start a new life and worship God in their own language."

As the young church plant continues to move forward, Faliala is pleased with the church's growth. "The church is going well and is healthy," he said through his interpreter Mokwa. "God is providing, and we are grateful and thankful for the blessing of a van."



One significant challenge facing Swahili Community Church is securing its own place to worship. Currently the church is meeting at Citizens Church near Akron University but is praying for a building of its own.

"We would like to find a location where we can worship freely," said Faliala. He noted that Swahili traditions of worship are different from American worship, and the church would also like to have a building of its own for events like prayer services and choir practice.

Faliala also sees the Lord moving in the church. He feels blessed by the assistance the church has received from Kocher and Dr. Rich Halcombe of Metro Columbus Association. "We receive money from Metro Columbus each month which helps the income of the church," he said. "Newborn Christians are coming to join the church, and we got a van. We thank you!"

Pastor Faliala and the Swahili Community Church ask Ohio Baptists to remember them in prayer. Please pray for the church to get its own building; to send out people with mission vision; to multiply in Ohio and beyond; to bring more teachers and students into the church; and to develop a micro business in sewing for the women of the church. They currently need sewing machines for this business.

"We are celebrating what the Lord is doing in Akron," said Kocher. "And telling people about it."

Because of Your Support, Millie Knows Jesus!

When you land at Guam's airport the locals greet you with "Hafa Adai!," pronounced "half a day" and means. "Hi" or "Hello." The island's Chamorro people are the friendliest people you will ever meet, and they were excited to see that help had finally arrived.

In August and September, Ohio Southern Baptist Disaster Relief (OSBDR) served on three teams with volunteers from four other states rotating through Guam at the invitation of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The mission was for SBDR volunteers to repair houses damaged by Typhoon Mawar, a devastating storm with hurricane force winds that struck the island in May 2023.

During their time in Guam, the Ohio DR volunteers were able to help people, including the pastor of Guam Christian Life Fellowship, a Southern Baptist church. However, one person left an impression on the workers. Her name is Millie.

The SBDR assessment team had an appointment with Millie at 8:30 am one morning, but when they arrived, they learned that Millie had been in the emergency room all night with her daughter.

However, Millie got up and the team was able to assess the damage to her home. While the assessors did their work, Wanda Temple, North Carolina DR, spent time with Millie, gave her a Bible, and prayed with her.

After the initial contact with Millie, another team from Ohio DR rotated into Guam, and one of their first jobs was her home. The project was to build a bedroom outside under a metal roof. The team went to work and completed the room in days with the help of Missouri **DR** volunteers

Sarah Jo Wright, an Ohio DR chaplain, was able to share the gospel with Millie, and she trusted Jesus as her Savior. That was the day Millie was set free, but it was also the day she had to go pick up her husband's death certificate. He passed away three weeks earlier.

Millie suffered great pain after a typhoon, her daughter's ER visit, and her husband's passing. Today she has hope and strength in Christ. The mission FEMA planned was for emergency home repair; The mission God intended was for a soul to find life in Him.

On October 1, a new fulltime staff member is joining the SCBO team.

Buzz Kocher, who currently serves with the North American Mission Board (NAMB) as a Send Network Ohio Church Planter Catalyst, will leave that role to become the SCBO Director of Strategic Initiatives.

"I am thrilled to announce the addition of Buzz to our team," said Dr. Jeremy Westbrook, SCBO executive-director treasurer. "His love for the local church, associations, and our state convention is contagious. His impact will be immediate as he helps to oversee the Cooperative Program, convention partnerships, and catalysts for the SCBO."

Kocher has been part of Southern Baptist work in Ohio, having served at Lifepoint Church, Delaware, as the College and Young Adult Pastor for five and a half years before joining NAMB.

"After joining NAMB in December 2020, I started learning about our convention and all it has to offer," he said. "It got me excited about our state. Ohio has a lot of potential. God is moving."

During his time with NAMB Kocher served eastern Ohio, working with, and encouraging church planters across that area of the state. "I have relationships across eastern Ohio and now I will be able to build relationships with pastors around the state." As he develops these relationship, Kocher hopes to find ways to serve churches and pastors.

"This is why we do this," he noted. "We go on mission together." He said that sometimes we say we are "in this together" to other Christian organizations, but in the SBC, it takes on greater meaning.

"The SBC takes this to a whole new level," said Kocher. "Based on the Baptist Faith and Message, we lock arms with 47,000 churches. We see unity conventionally and unity in working together. There's nothing like it in the whole world."

Kocher believes that Southern Baptists working together will reach the lost and raise the next generation of pastors from within our churches.

"Evangelism is important, but we must disciple our people. We have plenty of places to plant and replant churches, but we don't have the people to pastor the churches," he said. "We need to lead our people to find pastors from within our churches."

Cleveland Church Plant Seeks to Shine a Light From Former Strip Club Property By Timothy Cockes, Baptist Press

Cleveland, Ohio (BP) – It may seem strange for a church plant to purchase a property which was formerly a strip club, but pastor Josh Miller said Cove City Church's new renovation project fits right along with their mission of bringing light to a dark place.

Earlier this year, Cove City purchased a foreclosed building right next door to its current meeting space. The newly purchased property formerly operated as a strip club.



The neighborhood is Midtown just outside downtown Cleveland. Miller said there are several strip clubs on the street the church occupies, and violence is common in the area.

Miller, lead pastor and church planter of Cove City, said the church had been praying about buying this exact property, and jumped at the opportunity when it came.

"It was so fast paced with lots of details in a short period of time in the way God provided for us," Miller said.

"We're in this season of just watching what the Lord does and watching Him provide, and He continues to do it. We know what we have planned for this space is going to take a lot of resources. It's going to take a lot of time, energy, and money to actually get it to the point of what we actually want it to be utilized for.

"But we know that God didn't bring us this far to leave us hanging, so we're just waiting on Him and watching Him provide." Miller said buying a property in this location was not an act of desperation or a last resort.

The congregation has already been meeting in Midtown for some time, on a street which has garnered nicknames such as "forgotten alley" and "strip club alley."

Yet, he said the congregation has its eyes on the future, not the present.

"What I told our congregation was, 'Don't see what it is now, see it for what it could be if we as a church step into what God has for us," Miller said.

"It's not about seeing what it is now and going, 'We can't be here because there's too much violence, there's too much darkness around it.' Why would we look at it that way?

"For us we looked at it differently. We said, 'We see the darkness, but we also see that the darkness holds no candle to the power that the church has because of Jesus.' We just saw it for what it can be and what it will be if we continue to serve down there.

"We wanted to be what we're called: a cove. A place where people come and find that peace that's only found in Jesus. A place where people can feel safe to come to because they know that there's a church there who loves Jesus and loves them."

Miller and his family planted Cove City in 2019 as a part of Send Network.

The church outgrew Miller's home and began gathering on the campus of a local college, because most of the members were students.

The congregation grew to around 120 members, before the COVID-19 pandemic ended meeting on the college campus. Most of the students moved back home, began taking online classes, and never moved back.

The church would eventually relaunch with about 20 people, meeting in a local wedding venue closer to downtown.

Later it moved into the current location, a building which used to be a candy store.

The church, now running about 70 people, always dreamed and prayed of purchasing the building next door, which was formerly a strip club called "The Velvet Rope."

One day, Miller ran into a man in the neighborhood who told him the building was soon going to hit the market.

The church was ready and waiting to bid on the property just days later in an online foreclosure auction.

When offers officially opened, Miller immediately placed a bid slightly above another pre-placed bid.

He had prayed that no one who was interested in the property or had placed a pre-bid would even show up when the auction happened.

This is exactly what happened, and Miller's first offer won the bids. The church then had to raise more than \$125,000 in cash to officially finalize the purchase of the building.

Miraculously, through church members, various ministry partners and random circumstances, Cove City secured the money in two weeks.

The building was purchased in late March, and the church moved into the property on Good Friday.

Future plans for the building look like a complete renovation, which will include knocking down walls to create one shared space between the two buildings.

In the meantime, the church will continue to minister to its community in a variety of ways.

Cove City's outreach includes giving away toys at Christmastime, hosting community worship nights and partnering with an organization that both fights human trafficking and ministers to the women who work at the nearby strip clubs.




Miller said just like the purchase of the new property, these ministries serve the ultimate vision of the church.

"We feel very strongly that we're supposed to be there," Miller said.

"... If we want to see change in the city of Cleveland, like real transformative Gospel change, we as Cove City have to step up. We have to do our part in serving and working alongside what God is already doing in the heart of the city ... we're going to come along and be a part of being vessels that God wants to use for Gospel change."

assisting declining churches back to health

Pastors Need Revitalization and Encouragement Too

Since I began my role as the SCBO Church Revitalization Catalyst, I've had over 40 conversations with pastors and churches about the next steps to greater health.

I've also shared the process of revitalization in Ohio and written about the need for pastors and leaders to instill "rhythms" into their lives. I am thankful that at least six pastors have shared with me that they have taken time away with their wives to refresh and renew over the past few months.

I encourage all pastors and leaders to assess how healthy they are in leading. The North American

Mission Board (NAMB) has a simple assessment that is helpful. So, the question I want to ask today is "How healthy is your soul?"

This assessment is a tool designed to help you gauge the health of your soul. It is not exhaustive or meant to be a scientific assessment; rather it is a way for you to reflect on the condition and balance of your life and work. As you read through the following statements, evaluate how you see your present reality in each area. Remember, this is not an evaluation of how you want these areas to be in your life; it is an evaluation of how they are presently.

Honestly rate each statement below from 0-10 by writing the number next to the statement— 10 meaning you "strongly agree" and 0 meaning you "strongly disagree." Add up your score to see the results of your self-assessment.

- 1. I feel mentally sharp and focused most days.
- 2. I am energized by my call to ministry and rarely struggle with my purpose in life.
- 3. I am constantly encouraged by the companionship of the Holy Spirit, and I am ever aware of His presence in my life.
- 4. I am sustained and strengthened by my daily time in prayer and Bible study with the Lord.
- 5. Mentally, emotionally, and spiritually, I feel strong and equipped for daily tasks and challenges.

- 6. I rarely become critical and weighed down by the cares of this life.
- 7. I don't feel overwhelmed by worry, anxiety, or fear.

- 9. While I recognize the presence of temptations, I do not give in to them hoping to find relief from the stresses of life.
- 10. I generally have a settled soul without the presence of restlessness.
